Dear Parents and Students



Beliefs

The administrative and teaching staff at D.I.P.S recognizes the unique difference in individual capabilities and potential; hence they feel the urge to implement programs that meet the needs of each and every student. They also believe that the school should be the core of the educational experience with the family acting as part of that experience.

We believe that the teaching process should emphasize the building up of both mental and personal capabilities of the student to enable him/her to cope with situations he/she might encounter in the future. The process should promote intellectual, social, moral, personal, and physical growth as well as self-understanding, self-esteem and a strong foundation for future learning experiences. The school strives to help each student to achieve success in each area to the best of his/her ability.

The school strives to recognize that:

- 1. Students do not learn in the same style, speed, or pattern and that it is the responsibility of the school to take care of them as learners and as individuals. Hence, it should provide programs and opportunities that cater to the needs of its students and that witness to students' personal, social, and intellectual development.
- 2. Mastery of skills is not the same at all levels and that it is the responsibility of the school to provide structured and progressive experiences to lead students through all levels of the mental activity relevant to their age and ability.
- 3. Basic skills develop sequentially and are integrated and reinforced by their use in a variety of situations during structured learning, independent projects, and informal activities.
- 4. It is essential to create and maintain a climate that encourages freedom of thought while stressing personal responsibility. Students must be recognized as individuals. They must be encouraged to develop a moral conscience if they are to fulfill their potential and integrate effectively into society. As such they should never be called names, ridiculed or belittled.
- 5. Social development is influenced essentially by patterns of social behavior in the children's home environment, school, and society rather than through direct teaching. It is the responsibility of the school to create an environment where students experience models of society behavior such as cooperation, teamwork, responsibility, honesty, and commitment. Social development proceeds through the understanding of and the proper interaction with the various systems that operate in the society.
- 6. It is consistent with the provisions of the constitution and be committed to the idea of democracy and U.A.E, children rights, and civil laws.
- 7. Social development culminates in its expansion to a global magnitude, where students place themselves and their culture in an international perspective, understand and accept cultural specifics and differences, and assume the individual and national responsibilities towards international cooperation.
- 8. Physical development proceeds through understanding and acceptance of one's body, its functions and limitations, and the active involvement in its development through exercise, proper nutrition, and care. Physical education focuses in the early grades on body awareness and development of motor skills, and moves gradually towards structured games and activities that promote team spirit, leisure-skills, and physical welfare.

General Information

Dubai International Private School (DIPS) was founded in 1985. Centrally located in Al Garhoud, we have grown to be a large international community drawing students from Dubai and the northern Emirates.

Many of our graduating students go on to join top national and international universities. Most students join us in KG1 and remain with us for the following fourteen years, but we give a warm welcome to older students who join us at later stages of their education.

The academic program at DIPS is divided into four stages:

Kindergarten	a two year program (KG1 and KG2)
Elementary	a five year program (Grades 1-5)
Middle School	a three year program (Grades 6-8)
High School	a four year program (Grades 9-12)

School Accreditation

The school is accredited nationally by the Ministry of Education (MOE) in the UAE and Dubai International School-Garhoud (DIPS-G) is an internationally accredited US curriculum school where the medium of instruction is English. DIPS-G adopts the American Curriculum Standards for the subjects taught in English in addition to UAE Ministry of Education for all the subjects taught in Arabic. The school is licensed by the Knowledge and Human Development Authority (KHDA) in the United Arab Emirates and is accredited by both NEASC and Cognia (Advanced formerly).

High School Accreditation

DIPS students follow an American curriculum as they work towards the High School Diploma at the end of Grade 12, which allows them to join top international universities around the world as well as in the UAE. The Diploma, attested by the UAE Ministry of Higher Education (MOHE), and accredited by NEASC and Cognia (Advanced formerly), is equivalent to the Ministry's General Certificate of Secondary Education.

All Grade 12 students should be tested in EMSAT English, Math, Arabic and Physics, in addition to the possibility of taking Chemistry for students seeking a scientific major. For self-registration kindly click on the below link for the registration steps and details:

The UAE's MOHE will authenticate the student diploma, if the student meets the following conditions:

- 1. pass all required courses prescribed by the school,
- 2. pass SAT1 Math with a minimum score of 440, and
- 3. Receive a score of 61 in the IBT TOEFL or 5.5 in IELTs.

Students are prepared for the SAT1 and TOEFL tests starting from Grade 10.

Subjects of Studies

As an American curriculum school, we teach most lessons through the medium of English. The exceptions are Arabic Language, Islamic Studies and Social Studies, which follow the Ministry curriculum and are taught in Arabic for all Arabic native speakers. Students having non-Arab nationalities may start taking Arabic as a Second Language in selected grades.

French is offered as an optional course along with Computer Studies from Grades 1-8. Students wishing to take both subjects may join the afternoon clubs of these subjects.

To complement their academic studies, all students take Art and Music in KG and Elementary. All students take PE, and we are pleased to be able to offer swimming lessons to all grades in our own indoor swimming pool.

The school is adopting a curriculum that aligned with the American standards (CCSS) in English Language and Arts and in Mathematics for all stages. It is also following the NGSS standards in the sciences for all grade levels with some additions in the upper grades.

In 2016-2017, the school has started the American education system which offers a range of subject choices for high school students. As students begin preparing for university, it's important to familiarize with the choices that we offer at DIPS. Understanding the system will help our students focus on their future university choices of a study major and develop their education plan accordingly.

High school students in grade 9-12 have a range of elective courses to choose from to prepare them for their higher education courses and help them to be ready for their future choice of majors in universities. Courses include a range of business studies, social sciences, sciences, and art courses.

High school consists of grades 9-12. A diploma is awarded upon graduation from high school (12th grade) that qualifies our students to be admitted in college or university. College or university study is known as "higher education".

Students will have to submit their academic transcripts as part of their application for admission to university or college. Academic transcripts are official copies of their academic work in grades 9 till 12. This includes 'grades' and 'grade point average' (GPA), which are measurements of their academic achievements. Courses are commonly graded using percentages, which are converted into letter grades. A course is either awarded 1 credit or 0.5 credits depending on the number of teaching hours the course is taught per year. For example, the Arabic subject takes one credit, while the Islamic Education takes half credit due to the fact that the number of teaching hours for Arabic is double those for Islamic Education.

To complete high school and graduate with a diploma, students must successfully complete a total of 26.5 credits over the span of the 4 years of their high school. Some of these credits are mandatory and must be taken by all students and some are electives where students have the option to choose one course out of a group of choices.

Arrival at School

- All students are expected to arrive to school before 7:45 to get ready for the morning assembly.
- Front gates will be open starting at 7:00 am on school days and will be closed at around 8:00 am. Because we have such limited space inside the school, we politely request that you vacate this space as quickly as possible after seeing your children safely into school.
- Back gates will be open starting at 7:00 am and will close at 8:15 am on school days. The back gates are only available for pedestrians from 7:00-7:30 a.m.

Morning Assembly

- Morning Assembly is starts daily at 7.45 a.m. with the National Anthem of the UAE and a reading from the Quran.
- Morning Assembly is also a time when important announcements are made, general information on activities, meetings, and other school functions are given. It is also when student successes is celebrated. It is essential that students are present throughout.

Assembly programs are scheduled periodically during the year. The conduct of the student body at any assembly is an important indication of the cultural level of our school. Whether or not guests are present, each student is personally responsible for conducting herself/himself in a courteous and respectful manner. Unacceptable conduct includes whistling, inappropriate clapping, booing and talking during the assembly.

Break-time

- To avoid over crowdedness, students have different break-times according to their grade.
- During break-time, students may pray, visit their lockers, see members of staff, visit the cafeteria, visit the Library, take part in organized activities or relax with their friends.
- During break-times students are not allowed to stay in the classrooms unless they have a prior permission from the section supervisor.

Cafeteria

The school is committed to providing healthy food choices through the cafeteria that maintains high standards of food safety and hygiene.

- There are separate cafeterias for boys and girls in Grades 6-12. The KG and Elementary sections have their own cafeterias.
- The cafeteria offers a wide selection of food items at reasonable prices ranging from snacks, through freshly made sandwiches. Drinks, including fresh fruit juice, are also available. We try to encourage students to eat healthily by limiting the amount of fried and fatty food on sale.
- The cafeteria is out of bounds outside designated break-times.
- Running in the school cafeteria is not allowed and students are expected to be seated.
- For health and hygiene reasons, we ask students to eat and drink inside the cafeteria or in an outside area and not to take food to the classroom areas.

Food and Beverages

- Students should not eat or drink in classrooms (except for drinking water), library, laboratories, and other areas where food and beverages are not allowed.
- Students are not allowed to chew gum on campus.
- Junk food (i.e. chips, candies, lollipops, and soft drinks) is not allowed. Parents are encouraged to send healthy homemade snacks that consist of fruits or vegetables.
- Ordering food and beverages from external restaurants and store is strictly forbidden during the school day.
- Any food or beverages brought into the school must be approved and inspected by the Supervisor.

Lockers

- Lockers are available only to students who request.
- The student will be assigned a personal key for the locker. Replacement of a lost locker key is Dhs. 20. The school holds no responsibility of any loss of personal items from the lockers.
- Students must return the locker keys by the end of term 2. Students who fail to return the locker key will be charged Dhs. 20.
- Students may visit their locker before school, during break and at the end of the day, but not during timetabled lessons. Lockers are school property and should be kept clean at all times.
- Students are requested to maintain their lockers in clean and good conditions.
- Inspection of individual lockers may take place when there is a reasonable cause to do so.

Library Behavior Policy

• The library is shared by students, staff and other members of the DIPS community, thus all users are requested to behave responsibly and respectfully. Food and drinks are not allowed and neither is unruly, noisy behavior, nor any actions which could result in distraction or damage.

In order to maintain a pleasant and enjoyable learning environment we also ask that users clean up after themselves.

Care of Personal Property

- Students are responsible for their own personal property. It is recommended that students do not bring to school any valuable item.
- Any student who loses an item is to notify the supervisor immediately.
- All lost and found items will be placed in the supervisor's offices until the end of term. Unclaimed items will be donated to charity.
- School books should be clearly labeled with your child's name and the name of the teacher. If found, school books should be returned to the section supervisor. If your child loses a schoolbook, she/he should check with the section supervisor as soon as possible.

Respecting School Property

- Damaging school properties is considered a major offense. Students are expected to take care and be cautious when using school facilities and equipment.
- Students should not write or draw on school property.
- Students causing damage to school property will be fined and will be subject to a series of disciplinary actions which could lead up to expulsion in addition to a fine.
- Students are expected to use the school's technology appropriately and as directed and instructed by in-charge staff.

Sales on Campus

- Students are not allowed to sell items to others on camps except in activities where it is permitted by the administration.
- The Student Government may, with administrative approval, sponsor charity sales.

Celebrations

 Celebrations of birthdays for students and teachers are not allowed in classrooms and on school campus.

Gifts

Students and parents are not allowed to give a staff member any gifts. Staff members are not allowed to accept any gifts from students and parents. Parents are kindly asked not to send any gift items to school either to other students or teachers. This could cause discomfort to others and may lead to unwanted results.

Mobile Phone Policy

Based on the school's final review of the mobile phone use policy, the school has decided to update the policy and introduce new rules to avoid wrong use of mobile phones. The school shows understanding for some students whose safety is in question to bring their mobile phones to school. However, the school has set restrictions for bringing mobile phones to school based on its observations of incidents that caused distraction, carelessness, and harm that deviated students from their major learning objectives. Any member of staff may confiscate a mobile phone that is being used improperly. Confiscated mobiles will be returned directly to parents.

Therefore, the school has the following policy to manage the appropriate use of mobile phones:

1. Only students who use the metro station on regular basis can bring their mobile phones to school. Such students must:

Switch off their mobile phones before they enter through the school gate and switch them on after they leave the school campus.

2. In order to be granted approval to bring their mobile phones to school, parents have to fill out the attached application form and submit it to the section supervisor. The application form is to be completed by parents and will be saved in the students' files for referencing purposes.

3. If students bring their mobile phones to school without approval or use them during school instruction time, they will have to face the following consequences:

a. For the first incident, the mobile phone will be confiscated until the end of the school day.

b. The student violating this policy will lose 2 marks from the conduct average and parents will be informed.

c. On their third incident, the mobile phone will be confiscated till the parents arrive to school to collect it. The student loses the same number of marks from his/her conduct average in addition to receiving a written warning.

d. If the student insists on bringing the mobile phone with him/her, it will be confiscated till the end of the term. The student loses the same number of marks from his/her conduct average in addition to receiving a final written warning.

4. We strongly recommend that parents not allow their children to bring mobile phones into school. A student who needs to contact home during the school day or at the end of the school day can do so through the school office, with the permission of the supervisor.

End-of-Day Dismissal

- Staying on school premises during after school hours is not permitted. Students finishing at 1:00 pm must leave school premises by 1:45 pm and student finishing at 2:15 pm must leave by 2:30 pm.
- If students are involved in an after-school activity, they must be registered and under the supervision of a teaching or administrative staff, provided parental consent is there.
- The school is not responsible for any students who stay after the mentioned deadlines
- Students staying in the Waiting Rooms must be officially enrolled. You may refer to the Section Supervisor for more details.

Leaving Class or School

- Students are not allowed to leave class unless they have a pass permit from a teacher.
- Students should stay in class during the time of class change. Approval and pass permit should be obtained from the teacher teaching the next class.
- Students changing classes or coming back from their break are expected to move quietly in the hallways so not to interrupt other classes.
- Students are not allowed to visit or enter the staffrooms for any reasons, except if a permission from the supervisor is granted.
- Students are not allowed to leave the school premises during the school day.

If a student must leave the school:

- The parent must send an email to the Head of Section expressing therein the time and reason for departure and should present the request to the Supervisor prior to the morning assembly. If approved, the Supervisor will prepare a gate pass for the student to leave.
- The parent must collect the student personally from the Supervisor office. If the parent cannot pick up the student, they should confirm the identity of the person picking up the student either in writing or by calling the Supervisor and arranging the pickup.
- Students should visit the school clinic in case of illness or injury. If the student needs to leave the school, the school doctor or school nurse will call the parents to pick up their student after notifying the supervisor about the child's case.

Profanity and Violence

- Students are should not use profanity at any time.
- Students should not verbally or physically assault any staff or student.
- Bullying and fighting of any kind is strictly prohibited. Bullying of any sort will not be tolerated and will be treated as a very serious matter.

School Uniform and Equipment

The school uniform has been established to promote an atmosphere that emphasizes neatness and uniformity among our students. All students are expected to be in full uniform each day with the exception of scheduled non-uniform days. Failure to abide by the proper dress code may result in disciplinary consequences. In addition, students will be required to call their parents to bring them their uniform. The correct uniform is as follows

The following dress code applies to girls

- May wear one stud earring in each ear. No other jewellery is permitted. KG and lower elementary girls are not allowed to wear any earring for safety reasons.
- Your hair must be clean, neat and tidy and a normal hair color
- Nails must also be clean, neat and tidy and a normal nail color
- Make-up, tattoos, henna, or other markings is not allowed
- Long hair should be tied back during the school day
- Only shoes are allowed. Sandal and flip-flops are not allowed. Running shoes are only allowed on days physical education classes are scheduled.
- Do not wear any items of clothing which visibly display slogans or logos other than those of Dubai International School.
- Nose piercing is not allowed

The following dress code applies to boys

- Show that you take pride in your uniform. Shirts and blouses should be tucked in
- Your hair must be short, clean, neat and tidy and a normal hair color
- Tattoos or other markings are not allowed
- Only shoes are allowed. Sandal and flip-flops are not allowed. Running shoes are only allowed on days physical education classes are scheduled.
- Do not wear any items of clothing which visibly display slogans or logos other than those of Dubai International School

You may wear your PE uniform only on the days when you have sports lessons.

The correct sports uniform is as follows for G1-12

- □ School sports training suit
- □ Navy blue shorts
- □ Short sleeved polo shirt

Uniforms must be clean and neatly worn. Worn out uniforms must be replaced.

Bring the following equipment with you every day

- the correct textbooks and notebooks for your lessons
- pens, pencils, colored pens/pencils, a ruler, an eraser
- a calculator and any other equipment you need for Math and Science
- your laptop/ device

Do not bring any of the following to school

- Unless prior permission is granted, students should not bring any items that could disrupt the educational process, such as mobile phones, cameras, i-pods, laser pens, toys, or any electronic devices used for games.
- Any tobacco substances. Smoking is strictly forbidden in school campus.
- Any dangerous materials or objects.
- Valuable items or large amounts of money.

Student Council

We believe that all students have the potential to lead, and we therefore offer opportunities for them to develop their leadership skills in all aspects of our programs, through for example, role-play, discussion groups, posts of responsibility, community in service and activity, significant and problem-solving participation in the myriad of the activities that take place at our school. The student Council conducts student events such as Cultural Day, Flag Day, campaign awareness, fund raising and social activities.

For more details, please refer to the Activity Coordinator.

Camp:

A senior camp can be organized for grade 12 students as part of farewell activities that the school organizes. The camp follows a well-designed program monitored by the Head of High School / Supervisors.

Peer Tutor program:

A peer tutor program is available at DIPS. Many parents are delighted that the school holds this program since they won't have to pay for outside help.

- Senior students (tutors) who have excelled in a specific subject are matched up with a student who required extra assistance (tutee).
- The initial meeting will be arranged by the counselor in charge in collaboration with the HOS
- The time and location of each subsequent tutoring session is then mutually arranged by both students.
- Teachers are appreciated to name their struggling students who need extra help.
- Students who are struggling in a particular academic area are paired with a student who has a strong understanding of that content.
- Students are scheduled to meet at designated times during, before or after school.
- Attendance in tracked and recorded

- \Box Remind your children that chewing gum is strictly forbidden in school.

Parents are expected to:

- 1- Support school policies on behavior and attendance.
- 2- Bring problems and concerns directly to the respective supervisor or head of section for clarification and resolution.
- 3- Support mobile phone policy and not allow their children to bring mobiles to school and have their laptops instead.
- 4- Make sure that their children attend daily and on time.
- 5- Attend meeting for discussions about their children progress and where necessary arrange alternative times.
- 6- Ensure that their children wear the correct school uniform
- 7- Notify the school as early as possible of the reason for the absence of their daughter/son.
- 8- Support the school to prepare their children for future education.

Parent / Teacher Meetings

We invite parents to come to school to discuss their children's academic progress each term. In addition, we hold open parents' meetings where we explain our latest developments and invite you to share your ideas about our progress. We hope that these will

- help you understand what and how your child is learning
- give you the information you need to support your child's learning
- encourage you to be actively involved in your child's education
- encourage you to be actively involved in the wider life of the school, including our enrichment activities
- give you the opportunity to participate in our ongoing development and improvement

In addition, we will survey your views online through our portal and will ask for your feedback and evaluation of school activities and performance.

The Parent Council

The Parent Council represents parents in the school and provides an opportunity for more formal communication between parents and the school. The mothers are a dedicated group with great ideas and lots of enthusiasm, who are determined to make a difference for students, parents and teachers. The Mother Council will work in an advisory capacity to make recommendations and discuss issues relevant to the improvement of education. The Council provides a forum to all parents to suggest ideas to improve students' achievements. Activities run by the Council may also involve parents who are not members of the Council.

The Council may make recommendations to the administrations on matters such as:

policies and procedures; parental involvement; school improvement plans In addition to its advisory role, the Council may:

consult with other parents of students about matters under consideration by the Council; assist in planning activities and events as requested by the administration; promote best interest of the school community; seek required support from external bodies

The Council may not make recommendations on the following matters:

personal matters; commercial matters; individual student issues

The Council shall have a maximum of 10 mother members. The principal or his designee will serve as the de facto member. The Council shall be elected to a one-year term. Council members must have a child enrolled in the school to be eligible for membership. Council members may serve consecutive terms as long as they continue to have a child enrolled in school.

The Council should meet at least once in a term and should be led by a lead parent who is elected by the other members. Each mother, with a child enrolled in the school, has the right to participate in the Council membership.

Governance Board:

The school performance is monitored by a governance board which includes professionals who have long experience in quality management in various areas. They meet periodically with the Senior Leaders to discuss plans and follow up their implementation. The governance board members serve as a catalyst agent to improve school performance.

Teaching and Learning

Learning for the future

At Dubai International School, we want all our students to develop the skills that will enable them to be successful throughout their lives. These skills are often referred to as 21st Century skills. 21st Century skills are the skills, knowledge and expertise students must develop in order to succeed in the rapidly changing world of today – and tomorrow.

21st Century skills are

In order to do help our students develop 21stCentury skills, we are moving away from the traditional approach of teaching them **what to study** and focusing on helping them learn **how to learn**. Of course, during their time at DIPS, students develop high levels of subject knowledge and understanding. But we want to ensure that students can use and apply their knowledge and understanding in a range of situations. We don't want them to study, memorize and forget – we want them to learn, practice and remember. To achieve this, we need to focus on developing student centered learning.

Learning Support

During their time at DIPS, many of our students will need extra help and support with their learning. This may happen for a number of reasons, and often the need for support is temporary. Whether it is for a short period or throughout their time with us, we will do our best to ensure that all students receive the support they need to fulfill their learning potential. It is important to note that support is not needed only by students who find specific subjects very difficult, or who have a specific learning disability such as dyslexia: students may need support because of a physical or emotional issue. In addition, our Gifted and Talented students need support to ensure that they are able to use their gifts and talents to the fullest extent.

We aim to meet the needs of all our students through high quality first teaching in the classroom. We monitor all students' progress closely and identify those who need learning support at an early stage. Individual teachers, parents, or the students themselves might raise a concern, or a scrutiny of assessment data might suggest a need for support in one or more subjects. In this case, the appropriate member of the Learning Support Team will gather information, talk with the student concerned, meet parents, and negotiate an appropriate support strategy. Teachers, Heads of Department and Supervisors are an important part of this process.

Support Strategies

We use a range of strategies to support students' different learning needs. These include

- □ Providing differentiated activities, resources, and assessments
- $\hfill\square$ Providing adapted resources and assessments where necessary
- □ Providing additional targeted revision /re-teaching material
- Creating an Individual Education Plan (IEP) to support students with long-term needs
- □ Creating an Advanced Learning Plan (ALP) to support the gifted and/or talented students
- □ Arranging targeted one-to-one support

In addition, we work closely with external educational support agencies to ensure that students with very specific needs receive specialist support when necessary.

External Achievement and aptitude tests

The achievement and aptitude tests are international tests designed to measure the content knowledge of students and their abilities and skills in a number of subjects.

DIPS students submit the following tests:

- 1- **SAT I** (Scholastic Aptitude Test I). The SAT I test is an international tests that measures students' abilities in English, writing, and mathematics. It is held on specified dates and locations. DIPS students must pass the mathematics part of the test and achieve a minimum score of 440 to be eligible for the equivalence certificate.
- 2- **TOEFL** (Test of English as a Foreign Language). It is a test that measures students' abilities in the different parts of the English language. It is a requirement of most higher education institutions and I also required for student to receive their equivalence. A minimum score of 61 on the iBT test is required or **IELTS** with a minimum score of 5.5
- 3- EMSAT / Emirates standardized Test

Transportation

The school provides transportation service to its students in order to help parents save time and efforts. Although, the school highly encourages students to use the public transport system, such as the Metro which is conveniently located near the school. The school provides such services to selected locations based on the availability of the service to the locations requested.

Students using the service are expected to follow the same rules applied in the school while riding. All measures and policies applied in the school premises are also applicable in school buses, whether students are using the busses to travel to and from home or traveling on a school trip or event. Students using the school bus must understand that safety is vital. No disruptive or dangerous behavior will be tolerated and may lead to the student's banned from using the school bus.

Students are requested to follow the following directions:

- Keep the bus clean and tidy.
- Sit in the seat assigned to him/her by the driver and/ or assistant and remain seated throughout the trip.
- Fasten seat belt immediately when seated.
- Follow instructions given by the driver and/or assistant for safety purposes.
- Interact in a respectful manner with the driver and assistant.
- Arrive 5 minutes before the scheduled pick-up time in the morning. If the bus arrives at the stop and the student is not there, the bus will not wait and it is the responsibility of the parents to bring in their student.
- When classes are over, go immediately to your designated bus. Buses will leave at the designated times and will not wait for late students.
- Once you board the bus, you should not leave it.
- Refrain from causing actions that could cause safety hazard to the driver such as loud talking, loud music, fighting, etc...
- Refrain from eating or drinking inside the bus.
- Refrain from tampering with bus equipment.

Damaging any objects or material in the bus is subject to a fine and a series of disciplinary actions which could lead to denial of the service.

Please remember that all school rules apply to the school bus too. Incidents and offenses in the bus will be reported to the school administration and disciplinary actions will be applied accordingly.

Please remember that using school transport is a privilege. If you behave in a way which is unsafe, or which shows a lack of respect for others, we have the right to withdraw that privilege. If the student commits three offenses, the student will be denied the privilege to use the school bus.

Reporting and Solving Personal Concerns

Accidents

DIPS carries accident insurance to cover students whilst on school property, including buses. If your child suffers an accident whilst at school, we will let you know as soon as we can. If you find out about an accident, please let us know right away.

Medical Issues

If your child needs to take medication, please inform us in writing. We will not administer medication without your written permission, except where it is prescribed by our school doctor. If your child brings medication to school, it will be kept in the clinic and administered by the school doctor/nurse in accordance with your written instructions. Please label the medication clearly with your child's full name and section, and let us have the following information

- how much medication should be given
- \Box at what times of day the medication should be given
- should it be taken before/with/after food
- \Box what is the purpose of the medication
- are there any possible side effects of the medication

If your child becomes ill during the day, s/he must receive permission from the Supervisor before visiting the clinic. In an emergency, s/he should inform any member of staff and go directly to the clinic. The member of staff and/or the doctor will ensure that the Supervisor is informed and we will contact you as soon as possible. If your child needs to go home or to the hospital, we will ask you to collect her/him and s/he will be signed out of school as an excused absence.

Problems at home

We hope that everything at home will be trouble free for you and your child. However, if there is a problem, please let us know as much and as soon as you can so that we can try our best to support you and your child.

In the case of custody disputes, we would abide by the court order in regards to the rights of both parents.

What happens if you make a mistake?

If something has gone wrong and you find yourself in trouble, we will take the following steps

- \Box we will listen to all sides of the case
- where possible, we will ask for evidence from witnesses or others involved
- □ we will ask you to be very honest with yourself and with us about what has happened and why it has happened
- □ we will be very honest with you about what has happened and about why we consider it a problem
- we will apply the school rules and the school policies fairly and consistently

Problems in individual subjects will be dealt with by the Head of Department and Academic Advisor. Problems across more than one subject will be dealt with by the Supervisor and Academic Director.

Discipline problems or problems outside the classroom will be dealt with by the Supervisor.

If at the end of any investigation you and you parents feel that the final judgment was not fair, your parents should appeal the decision to the Vice Principal or the Principal to reinvestigate the case.

What if you have a problem?

There are many people you can talk to or ask for advice and help if you have a problem. If you have academic problems in one or more subjects, you may speak to:

- Your subject(s) teacher(s)
- Relevant Head of department
- The Head of Section
- Director of Teaching and Assessment

If you have personal problems, you may speak to:

- Your supervisor
- Any of your teachers that you feel close to
- Your class advisor
- The Social Advisor
- The Head of Section
